

# REGIONAL HEALTHCARE WORKFORCE COLLABORATIVE

New Regional Healthcare Workforce Collaborative for 2017 with 11 hospital systems addressing workforce issues. Advisory Board has been seated and tactics identified. First tactic is a proposal for Texas Workforce Commission Skills Development Fund with Bill Priest Institute securing funding for short-term, low-cost training for hospital partners.

### **GRANTS**

#### Health Informatics Curriculum and Training for Transformation (HICATT)

Grant-funded training from the Office of the National Coordinator partnering with UT Health School of Biomedical Informatics and six partners from Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and New Mexico. Online and in-person health informatics training with over 1,000 participants from North Texas.

#### **Competency-Focused Approach to Clinical Experiences**

Working with UT Arlington College of Nursing on grant developing clinical instruction model to determine effective/efficient range of clinical contact hours to prepare competent RN graduates.

# **EMPLOYEE OF THE YEAR LUNCHEON**

This year's 21st annual event on April 21 recognized 135 non-management employees from 57 hospitals with a theme of *Don't Stop Believing in the Power of You* with Chef Jeff Henderson as speaker.

#### North Texas Nursing Consortium Summer Institute

Held every August with 235 participants from over 35 hospitals and colleges with a theme of Nursing Care of Vulnerable Populations in Texas for 2016.

Five 2016 sessions with over 340 in attendance from over 35 healthcare organizations providing training for workers interested in precepting.

#### **PATIENT SAFETY SUMMIT**

The 10th Annual Patient Safety Summit will be held August 9-10, 2017 at the Marriott Las Colinas. The Theme is "Stand Up for Safety" with 400 attendees expected. The first day will focus on emergency management with featured speaker Dr. Abdusalam Nasidi, director of the Nigeria Center for Disease Control. Day two will include a variety of topics to include keynote speaker Britt Barrett, author of "Patients Come Second."

### SEPSIS COMMITTEE

The Sepsis Committee formed in 2016 with representation from Baylor Scott & White Health, Children's Health, Cook's Children's Health Care, JPS Health Network, Medical City Healthcare, Methodist Health System, Tenet, Texas Health Resources and UT Southwestern. Presentations on October 20, 2016 and May 30, 2017 titled "Beating the Odds of Sepsis" drew a combined attendance of over 200 people. ## **HEN**

The final results for the Joint Commission Resource's Hospital Engagement Network (HEN) showed 24 area hospitals participating. Nationally, the combined efforts of the 26 HENs saved 87,000 lives and decreased Patient Harms 2.1 million times for \$19.8 billion in hospital savings. Local HEN 2.0 results revealed a decrease of 887 Patient Harms with a cost savings of more than \$5 million.

# HIIN

The Hospital Improvement Innovation Network (HIIN) is a program sponsored by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to assist hospitals in decreasing hospital-acquired conditions and 30-day readmissions. More than 50 hospitals have joined the DFW HIIN project that began in October of 2016 and is supported until October of 2018.

### REGULATORY COLLABORATIVE COMMITTEE

The Regulatory Collaborative Committee (RCC) formed in 2016 and is open to any member hospital of the DFW Hospital Council. The RCC's purpose is to provide a way for participants to assist in obtaining a successful survey and meet regulatory requirements. Meetings identify and share best practices within a confidential environment.

## COMMITTEE VOLUNTEER HOURS

In 2016-2017, members donated 1,248 hours to serve on committees including:

- Patient Safety and Quality Committee 13 members, 169 hours volunteered;
- Sepsis Committee 16 members, 464 hours volunteered;
- Patient Safety Summit Committee 11 members, 209 hours volunteered;
- Regulatory Collaborative Committee 25 members, 406 hours volunteered.



### **PROJECTS**

#### **Texas Quality Initiative (TQI)**

The Sixth Annual Conference held May 11, 2017 at the William P. Clements, Jr. University Hospital in Dallas focused on initiative efforts. Approximately 50 participants representing regional cardiac surgery physicians and other quality-focused collaborators attended the conference. A special luncheon with invited guest Dr. Jeff Rich, project director of the Virginia Cardiac Services Quality Initiative, former director, Center for Medicare and past president of the Society of Thoracic Surgeons provided an engaging discussion regarding the future of cardiac surgery bundle payments.

#### Texas Regional Data Managers Network (TRDMN)

The Eighth Annual Meeting was held May 12-13, 2017 at the William P. Clements, Jr. University Hospital in Dallas, Texas and included participation from over 50 data managers. This year's meeting provided for in-depth discussion regarding important updates to The Society of Thoracic Surgeons (STS) Adult Cardiac Surgery Database data collection forms. Comprehensive data gathering is integral to the quality improvement efforts of the TQI.
