


Teresa Richardson, Respiratory Therapist Baylor Scott & White All Saints – Fort Worth

Melody Ellis, Charge Nurse The Heart Hospital – Baylor Plano



Kristy led the implementation of 79 telehealth carts for use in patient isolation rooms. These carts enabled more than 4,000 patient encounters, reduced foot traffic and decreased PPE usage. Thanks to her work, 973 nurses and 544 providers have been trained to facilitate virtual patient consults. Now, providers and nurses can conduct virtual patient consults. Kristy has spent countless hours educating, coaching and supporting the use of telemedicine.



Thresa Cox, Food Services Manager Children's Health

Accommodating the needs of patients in the specialty feeding programs at Our Children's House is Thresa's forte. When the pandemic began, she made sure the facility's kitchen pivoted quickly to enable team members to buy fresh produce on-site and flex food options. During this time, Thresa also authored two articles speaking on COVID-related food issues: "Cost Savings and Implications: Food Waste and Sustainability" and "Food, as Experience."



Tanya Detherage, Director Clinical Informatics Operations Children's Health

As recommendations for COVID-19 care evolved, Tanya played a pivotal role in the design of Epic electronic health record functionality. She led information services and informatics teams to produce workflows to enable clinicians to do the right thing at the right time. Her teams developed a "decision tree" for COVID-19 testing that was critical to the successful clinical management of patients and the preservation of scarce testing supply inventory.


Jeremy Byrd, IT Applications JPS Health Network


Jeff Frank, IT Applications JPS Health Network


Jennifer Allen, Nurse Manager ICU Methodist Charlton Medical Center


Chanse Boehringer, Charge Nurse Methodist Mansfield Medical Center


Duyen Taylor Nguyen, Respiratory Therapist Methodist Mansfield Medical Center


Teresa Carey, Respiratory Therapist Parkland Health & Hospital System


Jared Lange, Business Sustainability Director Parkland Health & Hospital System


Stacey Merlin, SPARKS Program Manager Parkland Health & Hospital System


Dr. Donna Persaud, Medical Director Homeless Outreach Parkland Health & Hospital System


Debbie Sayles, Vice President, Chief Nursing Officer Scottish Rite for Children


Alice Sebastian, Charge Nurse Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Plano
