Jonathan Efron, MD, Executive VP for Health System Affairs, UT Southwestern

Jonathan Efron, M.D., Jonathan Efron, M.D., a noted colorectal cancer surgeon, joined UT Southwestern as Executive Vice President for Health System Affairs in December 2023. Dr. Efron provides leadership over the clinical enterprise, including UTSW's Medical Group, hospitals, regional medical centers, and clinics. UT

Southwestern physicians provide care in more than 80 specialties to more than 120,000 hospitalized patients, more than 360,000 emergency room cases, and oversee nearly 5 million outpatient visits a year. Dr. Efron, Professor of Surgery at UT Southwestern and with the Harold C. Simmons Comprehensive Cancer Center, specializes in the treatment of colon and rectal cancer, inflammatory bowel disease, fecal incontinence, and anorectal disorders, with expertise in minimally invasive and robotic procedures and colostomy-sparing procedures, such as ileal pouch anal anastomosis. His research interests include sphincter-preserving surgery, recurrent rectal cancer, and minimally invasive surgery, among others, and he has published more than 71 articles in peer-reviewed journals, 11 book chapters, and over 104 abstracts. Prior to joining UT Southwestern, Dr. Efron served as Senior Vice President for Johns Hopkins Medicine's Office of Physicians, President of the Johns Hopkins Clinical Practice Association, and Interim Vice Dean for Clinical Affairs as well as Professor of Surgery and Urology. He earned his medical degree from the University of Maryland School of Medicine in Baltimore, completed residency at Long Island Jewish Medical Center, and did his fellowship at the Cleveland Clinic of Florida. He was later appointed to academic and surgical positions at Cleveland Clinic Florida and Mayo Clinic Arizona. He is certified by the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgery and American Board of Surgery.

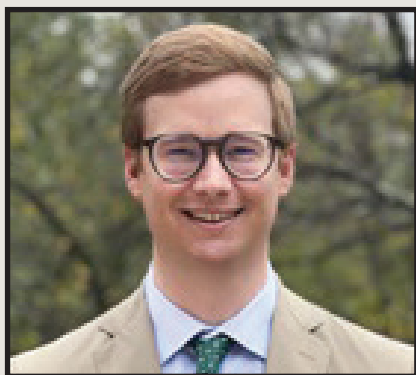
“Workplace Violence in Healthcare – the Federal, State and Local Perspective”



John Creuzot, Dallas County District Attorney

John Creuzot is a retired Judge and an award-winning lawyer now serving his second term as Dallas County Criminal District Attorney after first being elected in 2018. His background also includes more than 21 years as a Felony District Court Judge, seven years of service as a Dallas County Assistant District Attorney and Chief Felony Prosecutor as well as a criminal defense lawyer in private

practice. In addition to his trusted service, Creuzot has earned a national reputation for his innovative work on drug courts, criminal justice reform and evidence-based sentencing. He regularly appears in the news and on television as an expert on these and other criminal justice topics.



Jack Frazee, Director of Government Affairs, General Council, Texas Nurses Association

Jack Frazee is a graduate of the University of Houston Law Center. He began his legal career serving as a healthcare policy analyst for Texas State Representative Garnet Coleman in the Texas House of Representatives. Since obtaining his law license in 2018, Jack has advised healthcare non-profits and elected officials on emerging

policy issues and litigated a wide range of issues in state and federal courts. Jack currently serves as the Director of Government Affairs and General Counsel for the Texas Nurses Association and advocates for better laws and safety for nurses.

Dr. Joseph Chang earned his undergraduate degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, his medical degree from the University of Texas Southwestern School of Medicine including completing his OB/GYN residency at Parkland Memorial Hospital, and his Master of Business Administration degree from George Washington University. Program at Inspira Health Network from October 2021 to September 2025. Prior

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experience includes serving as Network Workplace Violence Program Manager at Bayhealth, where responsibilities encompassed developing and implementing a comprehensive workplace violence program, conducting safety rounds, and facilitating risk assessments. She has a Master's Degree in Administration of Human Services from Wilmington University and a Bachelor of Arts in History Teacher Education from Bridgewater College.

"Threat Safety Science"



Vicki King, Asst. Chief of Police, Converged Threat/
Risk Protection and Investigations, MD Anderson
Cancer Center and UT Health Science Center

Chief Vicki King has spent the better part of four decades in public service. She began her career with the Houston Police Department in 1985, rising through the ranks to Assistant Chief of Police. As Chief of Detectives, Chief King formed the Cold Case Murder Squad, Houston Men Against Family Violence, Cash for Crooks, and the Gang Murder Squad. Under her leadership, murder clearance rates increased from 57% to 78% in just three years. In 2011, Chief King retired from HPD to teach Criminal Justice courses for the University of Houston system. In 2014, Chief King was selected to be the first female Chief of Police for the City of La Marque. In 2015, Chief King accepted the challenge of advancing threat assessment and violence prevention programs at MD Anderson Cancer Center, the University of Texas Health Science Center, and the Harris County Psychiatric Center. Her distinguished work earned Chief King a national reputation as an innovator and highly successful practitioner in workplace violence prevention for healthcare communities. She has most recently collaborated with Sam Houston State University on threat assessment courses.
